Preface and *Sanctus* (Easter I)



Father, all-powerful and ever-living God,
we do well always and everywhere to give you thanks

By dying he stroyed our death;
by rising he restored our life.

not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place.
Then the other disciple also went in,
the one who had arrived at the tomb first,
and he saw and believed.
For they did not yet understand the Scripture
that he had to rise from the dead.

Homily

Renewal of Baptismal Promises

℣. Dear friends,
through the paschal mystery
we have been buried with Christ in baptism,
so that we may rise with him to new life.
Now that we have completed our Lenten observance,
let us renew the promises we made in baptism
when we rejected Satan and his works,
and promised to serve God faithfully
in his holy catholic Church.

And so:

℣. Do you renounce sin, so as to live in the freedom of the children of God?

℟. I do.

℣. Do you reject the lure of evil, so that sin may have no mastery over you?

℟. I do.

℣. Do you reject Satan, the author and prince of sin?

℟. I do.

℣. Do you believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth?

℟. I do.

℣. Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was born of the Virgin Mary, suffered death and was buried, rose again from the dead, and is seated at the right hand of the Father?

℟. I do.

℣. Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting?

℟. I do.

℣. God, the all-powerful Father of our Lord Jesus Christ,
has given us a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit,
and forgiven all our sins.
May he also keep us faithful to our Lord Jesus Christ for
ever and ever.

℟. Amen.

The celebrant sprinkles the people with the blessed water.

General Intercessions

The celebrant invites the congregation to pray and offers several prayer intentions. Each concludes, "We pray to the Lord."
