The celebrant recites or sings the Preface:

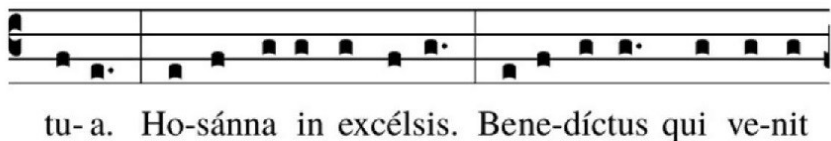
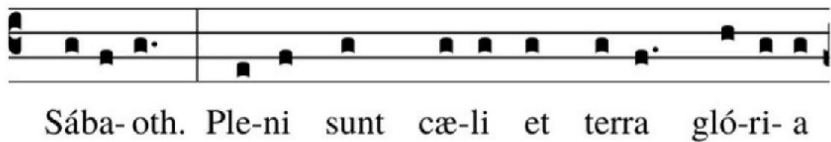
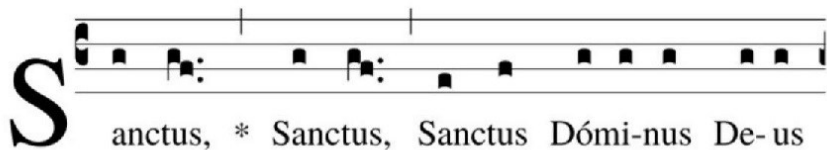
Father, all-powerful and ever-living God,

Eucharistic Prayer (II)

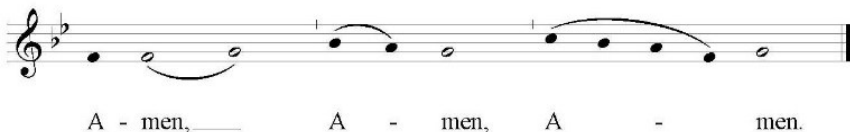
The celebrant prays the Eucharistic Prayer. After the consecration, the celebrant sings:


The Lord's Prayer


